


Preservation Self-Assessment Program

November 21, 2016: The PSAP has been updated to include inorganic museum objects! In addition to some small functional changes to the site, the PSAP resources and assessment tool now cover ceramic, glass, stone, and metal object materials.

The Preservation Self-Assessment Program (PSAP) is a free online tool that helps collection managers prioritize efforts to improve conditions of collections. Through guided evaluation of materials, storage/exhibit environments, and institutional policies, the PSAP produces reports on the factors that impact the health of cultural heritage materials, and defines the points from which to begin care.





YOU DON'T WANT A DIGITAL EQUIVALENT OF THIS.

Digitizing to archival standards of quality is different from (and pricier than) "just make me a DVD."

If you don't digitize to archival standards of quality, you **limit reuse possibilities** for the material.

STEP FIVE: LOOK AFTER WHAT YOU HAVE!




